What is GamerGate?


GamerGate is a topic that centers around harassment in the video game industry, with acknowledgement using the hashtag- #GamerGate. It started with a female game developer back in 2013. Since then the hashtag, and association of its use has expanded to other topics. The hashtag began in response to journalism ethics, but has since expanded to different roles in gaming- sexism and progressivism etc. in video games, as well as rights and ethics in the gaming world.



Social Justice Warrior

A social justice warrior, widely abbreviated as sjw on Twitter, is a word used for someone who is in support of socially progressive views. These include advocacy for women's rights, identity politics, multiculturalism, and civil rights. This term gained increased popularity during the GamerGate controversy, and has shifted from a compliment to an insult over the years of its origination.

"Its supporters say the whole thing was *really* about ethics in gaming journalism, but the movement gained widespread attention for a subset of GamerGate's supporters, who conducted several troubling harassment campaigns against women in gaming and journalists."(WashingtonPost)

4Gram Analysis of Collected Tweets

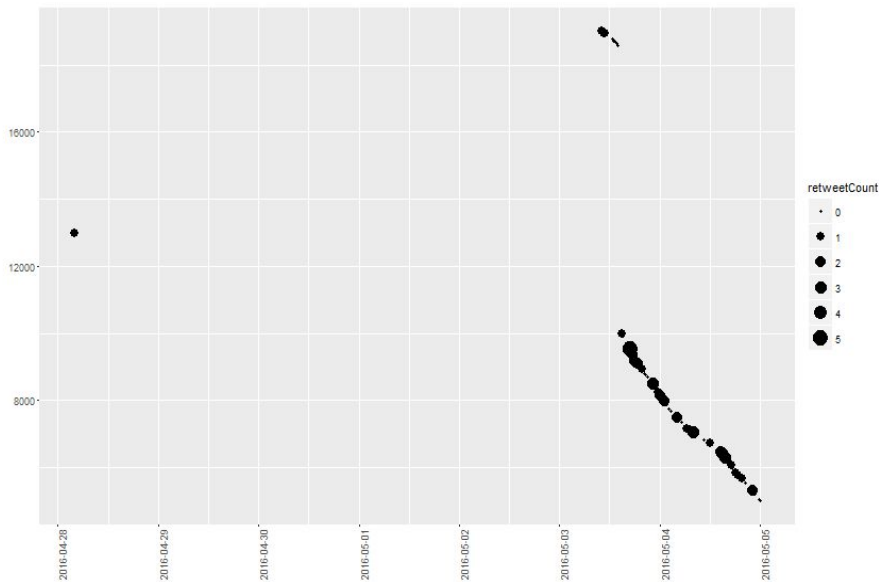


Displayed is the generated word cloud for the most common sequence of strings above a frequency level of 100.

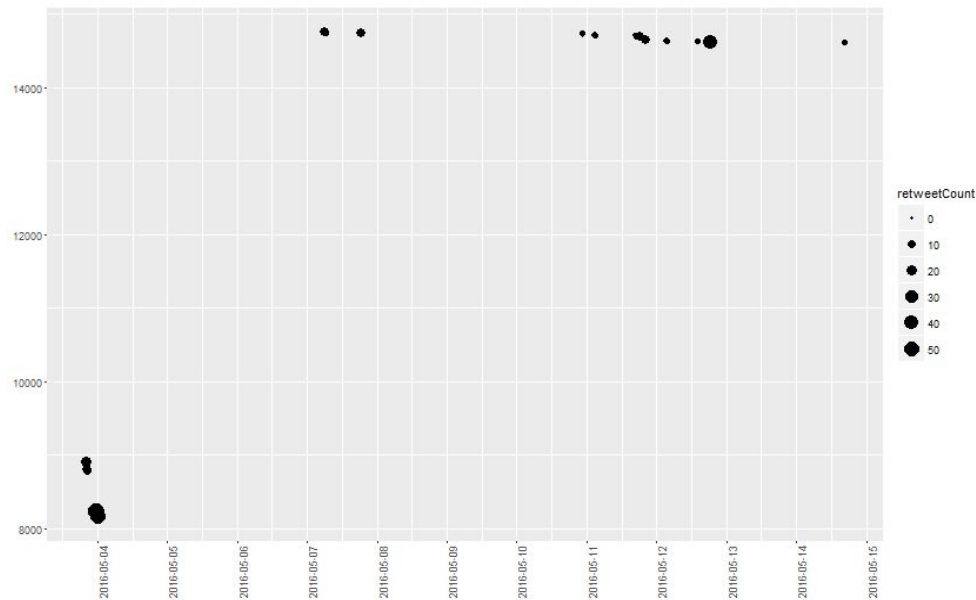
The cloud generated many sequences involving mainly the mentioning of “social justice warrior” for its 4 length of the string.



SQL Plot. ScreenName vs. RetweetCount



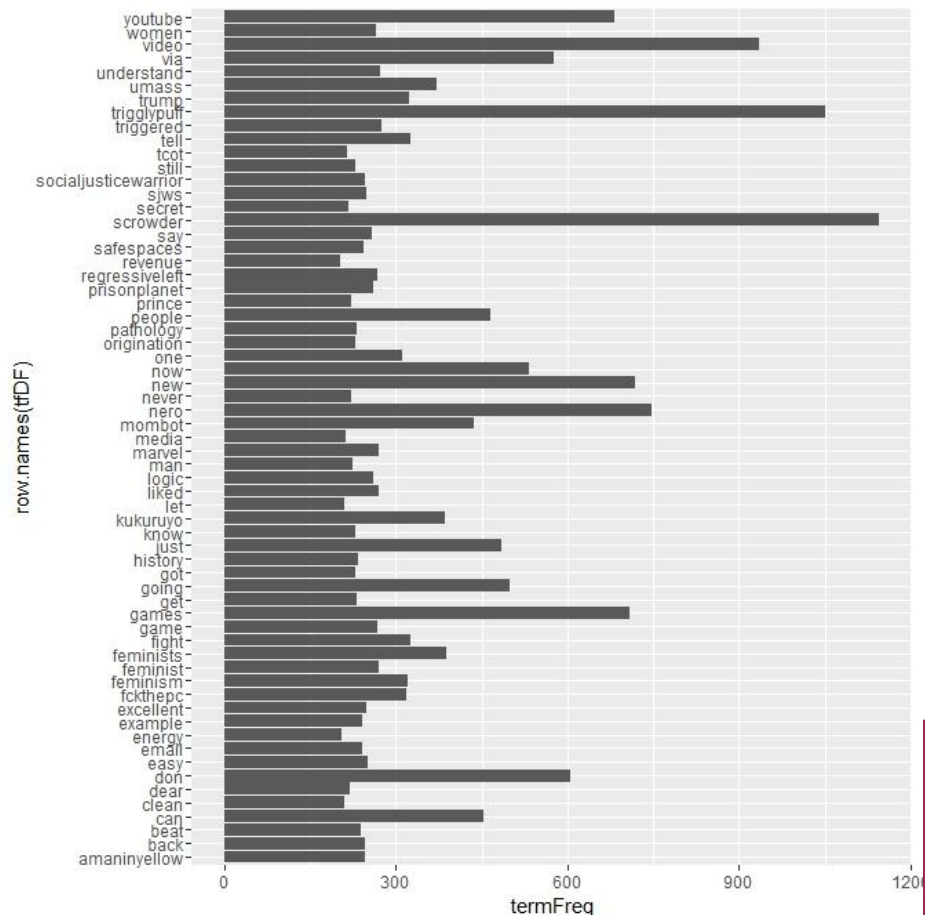
KotakuInAction retweetCount by Day

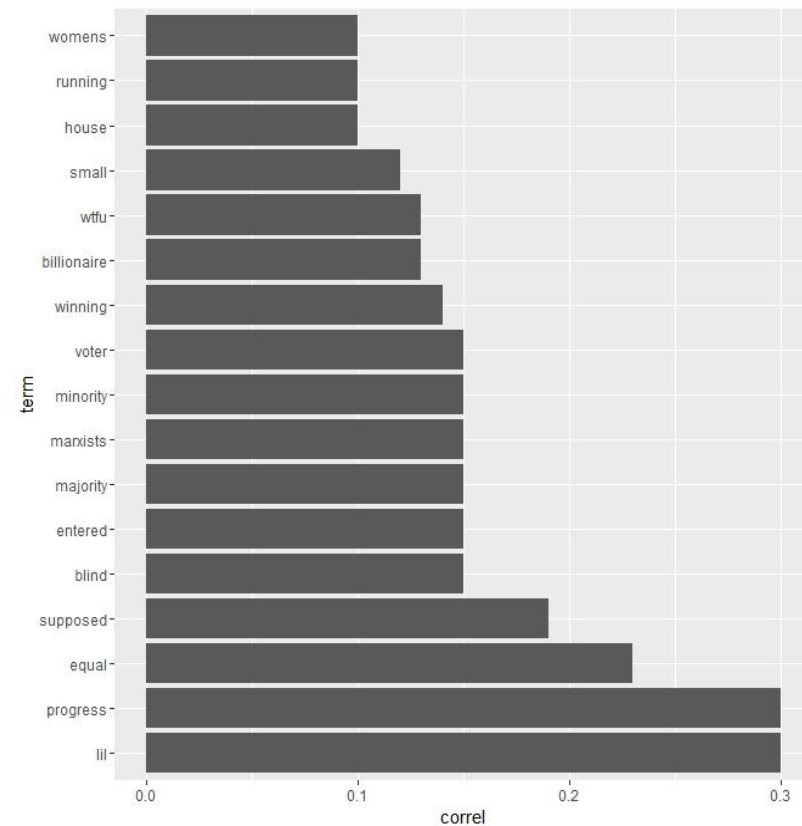
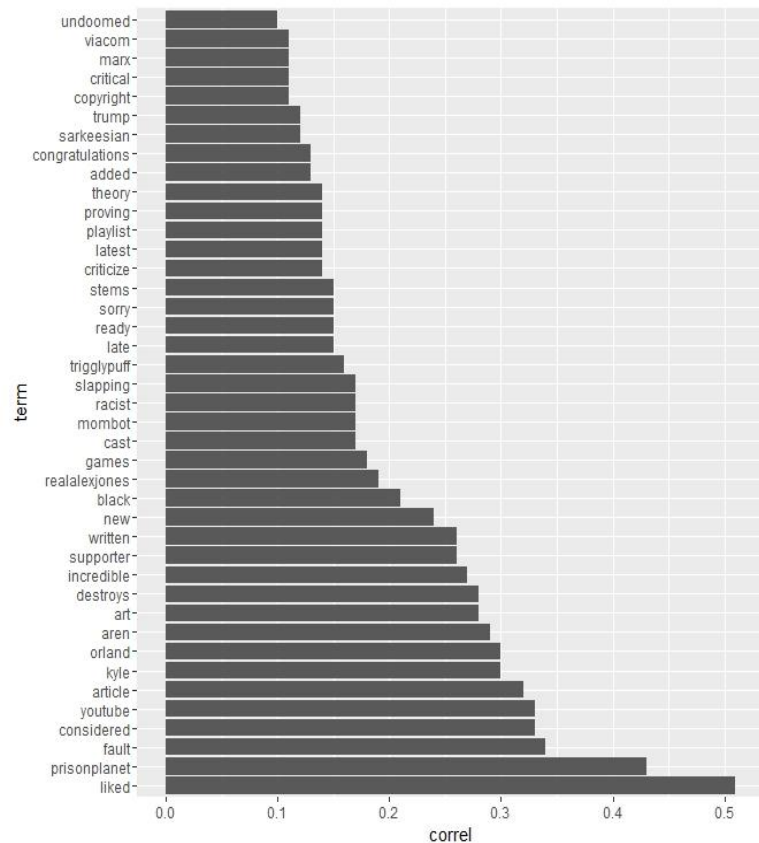


GamerGateTweets retweetCount by Day

Vcorpus cleaned Wordcloud and termFrequency

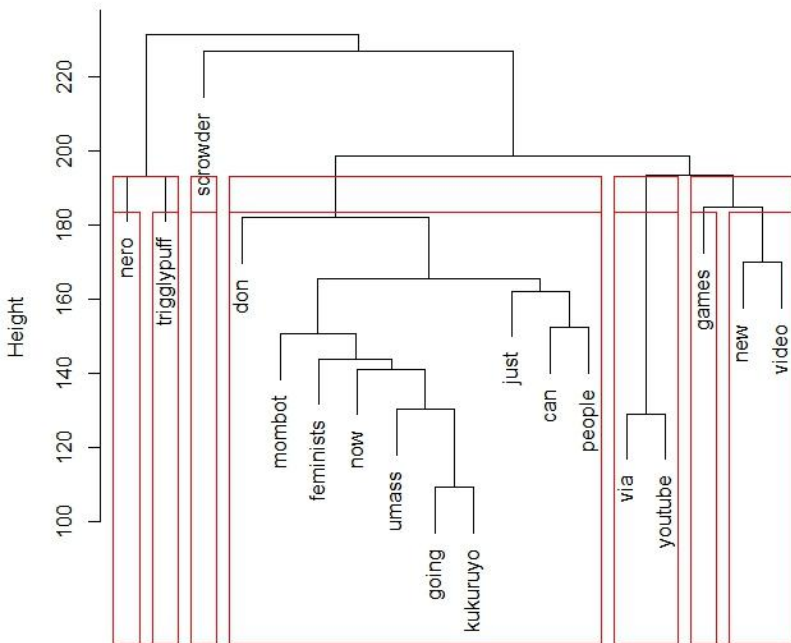




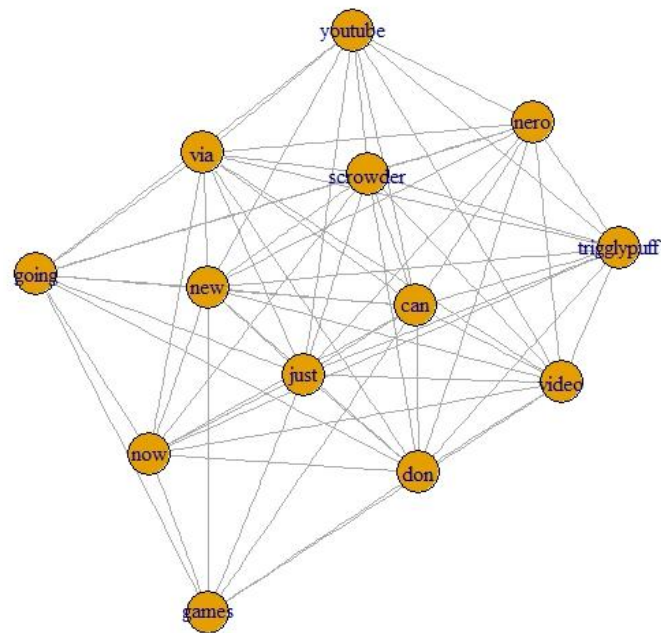
